



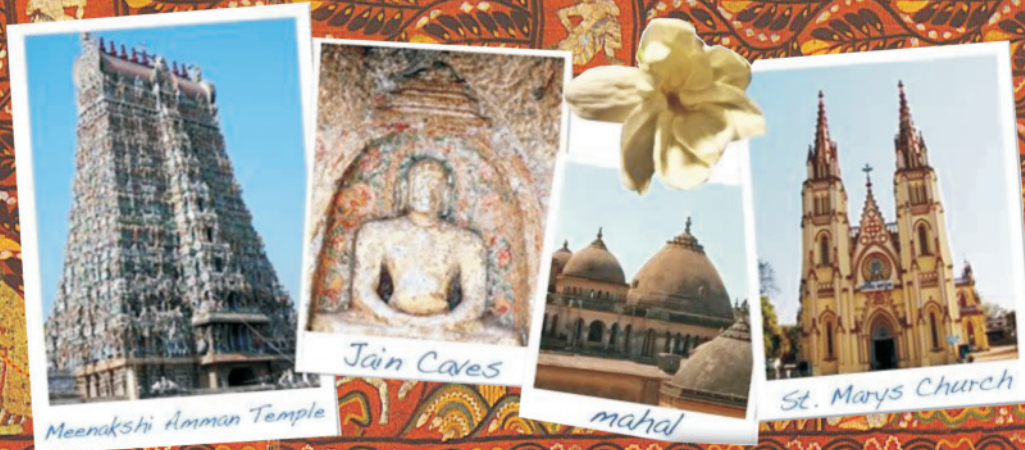

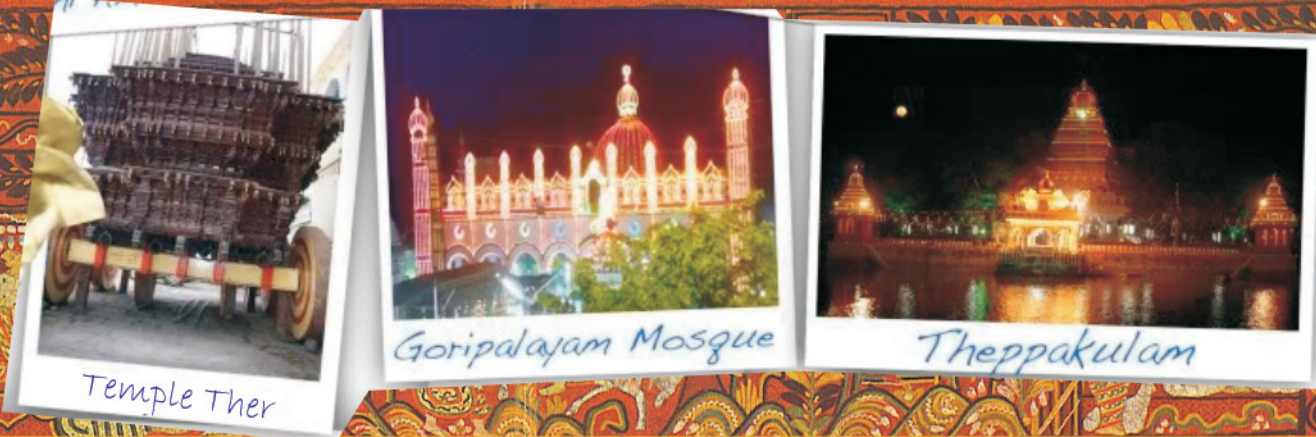

### The skies at night

INTACH Madurai organized a lecture on the significance of stars and constellations. Historian Dr. R. Venkatraman explained how Indians mapped stars and understood their impact on life. He peppered his talk with scientific facts and tales from Greek and Indian mythologies.

"There is an order in the seemingly chaotic arrangement of stars and constellations," says Dr. Venkatraman. "Most of the stars were named by the Greeks and later in the medieval period, the Arabs coined terms for them as they were seafarers and needed to study stars." According to him, Sumerians and Egyptians were the first to discover 48 constellations initially. Today, humans know of 88 constellations in the sky.

"Indians have mapped the sky from time immemorial," says Venkatraman. "The Tamils were traders and they depended on the stars to navigate the seas. And hence, astronomy as we see today is followed and studied ardently in the South." Indian astronomy takes into account only 12 constellations that are present on the ecliptic path of the Sun and the Moon. "These 12 are called zodiacs. The moon passes through all these signs every year. That's how the birth star of newborns is calculated," says Venkatraman.

The study of Astronomy begins with the Orion constellation which is a trapezium with a band of three stars in the middle. "In Indian astronomy, Orion is called 'Thiruvathirai' and is associated with lord Shiva. Indians related stars with major Gods of the Hindu pantheon." For instance, the most beautiful constellation called 'Pleiades' was named 'Thirukarthikai' and was linked with Lord Muruga.

Venkatraman says that ancient Indians named the months and the years based on the positions of celestial bodies. Even festivals were timed based on astronomical calculations. He points out Pongal as an example. The harvest festival marks the beginning of the Sun's journey towards the north, referred to as 'Uttarayanam'.

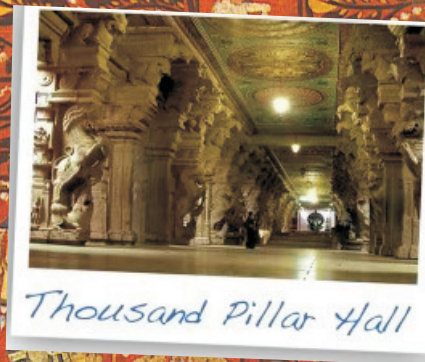
Dr. R.V. Krishna Kumar, Associate Professor, Department of Physics, Thiagarajar College, elucidated the theories of atom and space and their relation to astronomy. "It's amazing how people made astronomical calculations in the olden days. They devised days and months just based on naked-eye observations," says Krishna Kumar. "The order of days in a week is based on the movement of planets. Astronomy is a combination of Mathematics and science."

To take the initiative further, INTACH has planned to arrange a star gazing event later in the year.

### Birdwatchers spot 25 species near Avaniapuram tank

A group of nature enthusiasts, photographers and students descended near Avaniapuram tank, one of the avian habitats on the outskirts of the city, here on Sunday to catch a glimpse of exotic birds.

Around 40 people led by a couple of birdwatchers and equipped with binoculars, telescopes and high-end cameras, braved bushy growth and a rocky terrain to take vantage positions to see the birds. They managed to spot at least 25 kinds of species, including migratory birds from Central Asia.

Kumaran Sathasivam, an expert birdwatcher, said, "Birds like Rosa Starling, Shoveller and Common Swallow were spotted near the waterbody."

Later speaking at a presentation programme held in Thiagarajar College, Mr. Sathasivam said, "Bird watching is an exciting hobby. You don't need cameras or expensive binoculars to become a birdwatcher. Sitting at a point for hours and noticing birds flying overhead itself is a great experience."

Expressing concern over the dwindling number of common bird species such as home sparrows, he said the absence of trees was one of the prime reasons.

Before registration, the participants were given a brief introduction on the objective of the programme. Such events were being held to create an awareness of watching and conserving birds among the public, said P. Rajesh, convener, Indian National Trust for Art and Cultural Heritage (INTACH). The bird watching programme was organised by the INTACH's Madurai chapter.

### Women feel Madurai is safe

Thanks to its traditional and conservative set up

On Saturday, 29-year-old G. Usha, a mother of two, explored the temple city for the first time.

"Though I was born and raised in Madurai, I had no idea about the historically significant structures that are in the city. The treasure hunt event gave me a chance to get to know my city better," said Mrs. Usha, a participant of "The World of Women" event organised by The Hindu to celebrate the International Women's Day.

Around 75 women took part in the treasure hunt organised in the surroundings of Tirumalai Naicker Palace and Meenakshi Sundareswarar temple by The Hindu along with the Indian National Trust for Art and Cultural Heritage (INTACH). At the same time as Mrs. Usha and others were hunting for treasures in one part of the city, nearly 100 women took out "Heels on Wheels" an all-women two wheeler rally from Teppakulam to V Grand Hotel near Mattuthavani, where exciting cultural events awaited them. The rally was flagged off by Deputy Commissioner of Police Samant Rohan Rajendra.

More than 250 women were part of the cultural events organised by The Hindu. Vovinam, a team from Puducherry, performed martial arts. Fun games and dance events were conducted, following which prizes were distributed for the teams that won in the games and the best dancers. Following the cultural events was a panel discussion on "How Safe are Women in Madurai". Dr. Rohini Sridhar, Chief Operating Officer of Apollo Speciality Hospitals, S. Selvagomathy, Deputy Director of Soco Trust, Janet Sankar, Professor at Madurai Institute of Social Sciences, and Bimla Chandrasekar, Director of EKTA Foundation for Women, were in the panel discussion moderated by Soma Basu, senior journalist of The Hindu Metroplus.

Madurai is safe for women unlike big cities like Delhi, but it can be made safer, said Ms. Bimla. "In a recent survey, college students admitted that there was no fear of extreme violence, but they were being eve-teased in public places. It is a collective responsibility to make people realise that women have the right to use the public place," she said.

Ms. Janet noted that in a city like Madurai, public did come in defence of women when they were subjected to eve-teasing. Discussing reasons why Madurai was safe for women, Dr. Rohini said that the traditional and conservative set up of Madurai is a positive factor. Following the panel discussion, Dr. Rohini Sridhar distributed prizes to the winners of the treasure hunt.

Priyalatha Arun grew up in Singapore watching her idol and Indian actor Vyjayanthimala dance in films and on stage. "I never missed her stage performances in Singapore. She has everything a dancer can ask for, dancing toes, grace and charm, big eyes, the dedication and mastery in the arts she pursued," says Priya.

Belonging to a family of lawyers, Priya too became a barrister. But that didn't mean she let go her passion for dance. At the age of eight she enrolled herself in the Singapore-India Fine Arts Society (SIFAS) and started taking classes from teachers who came from Kalakshetra, Chennai.

In just five years, she says, she was ready for arangetram and quickly gained recognition for her performance. "I think I was born to dance," she smiles as her dancing career never looked back even as she multitasked, as a barrister, as a wife and a mother and a stage actor.

Sadly, she says for most Bharatanatyam students in Singapore, both in the past and now, the love for dance culminates with the arangetram.

Though the arts are not usually remunerative, Priya never allowed it to take a back seat in her life. She continued her *sadhana* and took Bharatanatyam to a new meaning in a foreign land. "I was the first in my family to practise law, dance and act together, and luckily, found the support for all three," she says.

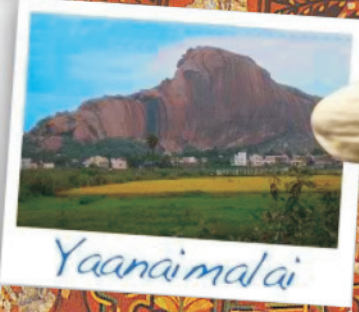

## TRADITIONAL RECIPES

### KOLLU SOUP (Horse gram)

#### Ingredients:

Kollu - 200 gms for about 6 bowls of soup

Onion - 1 big

Tomato - 2

Garlic

Pepper

Cumin

Oil(gingely)

Green chilli

Curry leaves

Salt

Turmeric

#### Method:

Dry roast the kollu and powder coarsely , parboil for 10 minutes in 4 cups of water

Grind the garlic, green chili ,cumin ,pepper into a paste

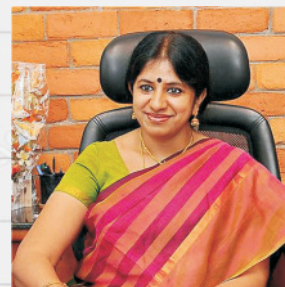
Chop the onion, tomato

Heat a kadai , add small quantity of gingelly oil and saute the Paste

Add the tomato & onion and sauté , add turmeric powder.& salt as required

Add the parboiled kollu and boil for further 5 minutes

Strain and serve hot.

## VARAGU MILAGU SATHAM (Rice)







### Ingredients:

Varagu  
Pepper - ground coarsely  
Dry chilli  
Curry leaves  
Channa dhal  
Ghee  
Salt(as needed)

### Method:

Cook the varagu in 1:2 ratio in water in an open vessel and when 75% done, strain and add salt.  
Add a little ghee in a kadai, add channa dhal ( kadalaiparuppu), dry chilli, curry leave, pepper  
Mix with cooked rice with & add the fry item.  
Serve hot with sambar.



-  Millets are rich in nutrients and are a good alternative to rice .
-  High in fibre, they can be included in the daily diet in many forms.
-  Ragi, Kambu, varagu, thinnai, samai are some of the more popular millets that formed a staple diet of our ancestors.
-  Suitable for semi arid regions , millets were cultivated in “Mullai” – the forest regions of the Tamil country
-  Today, there is a renewed interest and awareness about the benefits of consuming millets.
-  Ironically the area of cultivation having come down drastically, millets that were once considered the poor man's food, is now more expensive than rice .

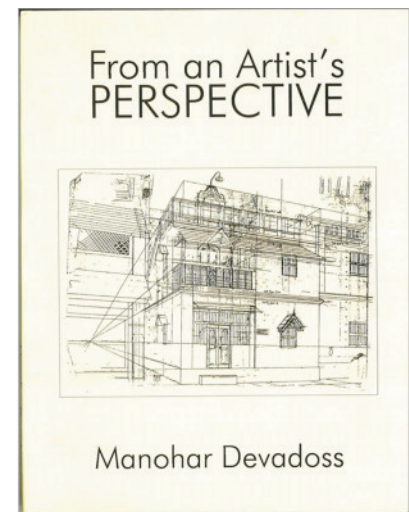

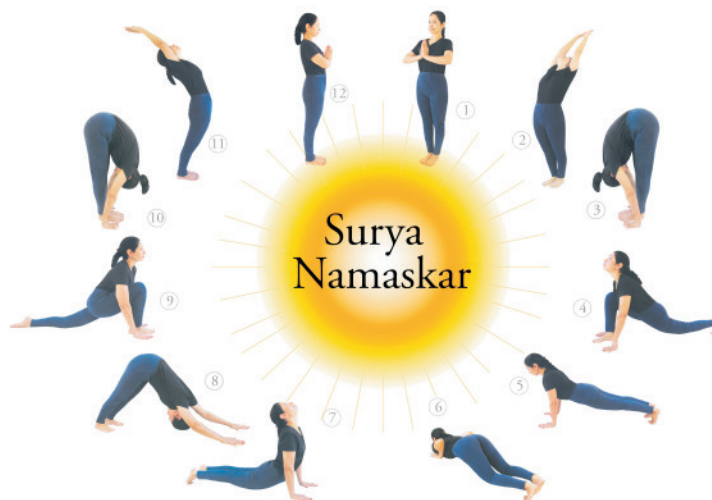

#### YOGA ASANA - "SURYA NAMASKAR- "A SALUTE TO THE SUN"



##### Instructions for Practice

1. Om Mitrāya Namaḥ (Salutations to the friend) Pranamasana: Exhale, stand upright, with your hands in prayer position. Steady your body, fix your eyes and look forward and breathe evenly.
2. Om Rāvaye Namaḥ (Salutations to the ever shining) Hasta Uttanasana: Inhale, raise your hands up, gently bend backwards. Look upwards and breathe.
3. Om Sūryāya Namaḥ (Salutations to the cosmic light) Pada Hastasana: Exhale, bend forward, press your palms on the sides of your feet. Look downwards and breathe.
4. Om Bhānave Namaḥ (Salutations to the illuminator) Anjaneya Asana: Inhale, stretch your right leg far behind. With support of your hands, arch your spine. Look upwards and breathe.
5. Om Khagāya Namaḥ (Salutations to the performer) Adho Mukha Svanasana: Exhale, take your left leg far behind, adjust and stretch. Look downwards and breathe.
6. Om Puṣṇe Namaḥ (Salutations to the nourisher) Ashta Anga Namaskara: Inhale, bring toes under, knees down, hips up. Exhale, chest and chin down. Look downwards and breathe.
7. Om Hiranya Garbhāya Namaḥ (Salutations to the golden womb of universe) Urdhva Mukha Svanasana: Inhale, raise your head and chest, lift your thighs and pelvis off the floor. Stretch and look upwards and breathe.
8. Om Marīcāye Namaḥ (Salutations to the power that heals) Adho Mukha Svanasana: Exhale, press your palms and feet, raise your hips and stretch your legs and hands. Lower your head. Look downwards and breathe.
9. Om Adityāya Namaḥ (Salutations to the son of Aditi) Anjaneya Asana: Inhale, bring your right foot forward between your palms. Stretch your back leg. Arch your spine. Look upwards and breathe.
10. Om Sāvitre Namaḥ (Salutations to the stimulator) Pada Hastasana: Exhale, bring your left foot forward, bend forward, stretch your legs and hands. Lower your head and look downwards and breathe.
11. Om Arkāya Namaḥ (Salutations to the essence of life) Hasta Uttanasana: Inhale, roll up, bend backward. Look upwards and breathe.
12. Om Bhāskarāya Namaḥ (Salutations to the enlightener) Pranamasana: Exhale, stand upright, with your hands in prayer position. Look inwards and breathe.



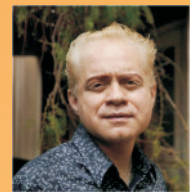


### ARTICLES CONTRIBUTED BY MEMBERS

#### *Cultural confluence*



As we all know Madurai being one of the oldest ( the oldest according to Mr.Manohar devadas ) continuously existing cities in the world has come to cultural crossroads time and again and it has been able to overcome the issues because it is mainly practiced the co existence policy of "live and let live".

For example the Meenakshi Thirukalyanam portrayal of Mahavishnu giving away Sakthi (Meenakshi) in marriage to Shiva that is one of the most popular depictions in almost every wedding invitation today is a classic example.

During that era the Nayaks were vaishnavites who passionately patronized the temples of Sundereshwara and Meenakshi ( they were separate temples till Thirumalai naiks period) arrived at this portrayal and popularized it to bring total harmony between the Devi upasakars who practiced Shaktham , Veerasaivas who practiced Saivism and the Vaishnavaities by explaining to them that all three came from the same family.

Another amazing fact is distribution of Vibhuthi as Prasad in the Talakkulam mosque even today. ### *Towering wonders*

*Mention Madurai, the first visualization of the city will be that of the towering gopurams of Meenakshi Amman temple filled with intricate figures and engravings. These skyscrapers hold the key to the legacy of various dynastic rules.*

*The earliest mention of the 'gopura' is found in the Thevaram of Sambandar (Alavai Pathigam). In earlier days, temples were simple structures with sanctum sanctorum, artha mandap, frontage with one corridor. The gopuram at the entrance was usually shorter than the vimanas. However, the style of construction changed during the reign of Raja Raja Cholan-I, who constructed two gopurams in the same direction (eastern side) at Thanjavur. Later, rulers of Chola dynasty constructed one gopura each on four sides.*

*The Meenakshi Sundareswar Temple in Madurai in all has 12 gopurams in three corridors. The four main outer gopurams in four directions have a grace of their own and stand as a monumental testimony to the artistic genius of hands that worked on them. All the outer gopurams are nine storeyed structures measuring 150 feet each and all of them have their curved and concave sloping sides.*

*The East Gopuram: The base of the gopuram is a stone structure consisting of two storeys - a ground floor and an upper storey. This was built by Maravarman Sundarapandiyan I in the 13th Century A.D. and was named after him as Sundara Pandiyan Thirugopuram. In the second storey of the gopura there are four inscriptions. These pillars with earlier inscriptions probably indicate that the gopuram construction might have begun under earlier Pandya ruler and completed during the reign of Jatavarman Sundara Pandiyan.*

*The West Gopuram: Built by Parakrama Pandya in the 14th Century A.D. has many relics of older structure mainly on the ground floor covered with stucco figures of legendary and iconographic nature. Notable figures are that of the churning of the ocean.*

*The South Gopuram: Built by Sirapalli Sevvandi Mudaliar during the 15th Century A.D. It is the most beautiful gopuram with two tiers of high stone base with proportionate space and recesses. All the wall pilasters of the south gopuram have the Vijayanagar type of squatting lions at their base.*

*The North Gopuram: Built by Veerappa Naicker, grandson of Viswanatha Naicker in 1600 A.D. Till recent years it was without a roof and therefore it was called mottai gopuram. During the end of the last century, Nattukottai Chettis provided the mottai gopuram with a roof. Besides these four outer gopurams, there are eight inner gopurams in which only the Chitra gopuram has a seven-storeyed structure while the remaining gopurams have five-storeys or less. The other gopurams are Nadukattu, Kadaka, Palaka, Cinna Mottai and two sannidhi gopurams.*

*Besides these ancient and artistic gopurams, the unfinished Raya gopuram has its own magnificent tale to narrate similar to its stupendous structure.*

*It lies to the east of Pudu mandapam. Measuring 200 by 120 feet, it is nearly twice the size of the base of the East gopuram. The monolithic pillars of Raya Gopuram are over 50 feet high and mark the high degree of proficiency of the Dravidian stonemasons. Its pavilion pillars, lion-based pilasters and the carvings on the jambs display a keen sense of ornamentation. There are many reliefs (pudaippu sirpam) of Thirumalai Naicker and his queens and a figure of Meenakshi's coronation on the wall of the structure. The structure owes its origin to Thirumalai Naicker.*

*If it had been completed, it would have been one of the biggest and most artistic gopurams in South India.*
